



Compliance Officer Report... Jim Backus

Brothers and Sisters. H-2B Visa The H-2B Visa is a work visa

that allows employers to bring foreign nationals into the United



States to fulfill jobs of a non-agricultural nature. This obviously could include open positions in any of the Building and Construction Trades areas. With the anticipated upcoming workload, this may possibly become an issue in our area. The Twin Cities have already experienced a problem regarding H-2B workers. These positions can only be filled as a temporary status and the employer must be able to prove certain criteria. The locations as to where these workers can work are specified by the Department of Labor (DOL). To be qualified under the H-2B Visa, the employer must attest to the DOL that: -the position is temporary (one time occurrence; seasonal need;

peak load need; intermittent need. This is normally a maximum of one year)

-the employer is unable to locate current US workers to fulfill those positions

-the utilization of H-2B Visa workers will not adversely affect any wages, benefits or working conditions of current US workers performing like work

-the pay must equal the applicable federal or state minimum wage or prevailing wage, if applicable

-the employer must notify the US Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) if the H-2B worker does not report to work, if they are terminated or the temporary work is completed earlier than anticipated

As with anything, and as noted from the Cities, this program has the opportunity for abuse. A company based in the Dakota's was utilizing H-2B Visa workers in a construction trade. They were only allowed to employ these workers in a certain area of North Dakota. The contractor brought these workers into Minnesota, the Twin Cities area, violating the agreement, and taking jobs away from local people. The Fair Contracting Foundation (FCF) was able to get the H-2B Visa workers removed off of the job and a complaint filed against the contractor. It was then learned that this contractor had previous violations for abusing this program.

If anyone would happen to observe a contractor that may be utilizing H-2B Visa workers, please let me know. I will check into if they are legally allowed to be where they are and if the contractor is legitimate. As quoted by Harry Bridges, "The most important word in the language of the working class is 'solidarity'."

OFFICIAL NOTICE OF NOMINATIONS AND ELECTIONS I.B.E.W. LOCAL UNION 343

The nominations for all officers of Local Union 343 will be held on May 12, 2016, beginning at 7:00 p.m. at the Eagles Club in Owatonna located at 141 E. Rose. Anyone desiring to be nominated must be present during the nominations or provide a written and signed statement that they will accept the nomination. No member may be a candidate for more than one office. Anyone nominated to more than one office must choose the office for which they will be a candidate.

Nominations do not require a second to be accepted.

Nominations will proceed in the order of offices as listed in the IBEW Constitution whose term of office shall be 3 years:

Nominations will be taken to fill the following offices:

President/Delegate to International Convention

Vice President

Recording Secretary

Treasurer

Financial Secretary/Business Manager/Delegate to International Convention

Executive Board (5 to be elected)

Examining Board (3 to be elected)

Additionally, nominations will be held for two (2) delegates to the International Convention.

In order to be nominated, a member must have a minimum of 2 years of continuous good standing in Local Union 343. Good standing means that the member is current in their payment of dues and has been for the 2 years preceding the nominations.

No Apprentice shall be eligible to hold office in the Local Union.

An election judge and tellers will be appointed at the close of nominations. None of these may be a candidate for any office.

The election shall be conducted by mail ballot and they shall be counted beginning at 9:00 a.m. on June 9, 2016.

All members in good standing shall be mailed a ballot not less than 15 days prior to the above specified date. Ballots received at the P O Box after 4:45 p.m. on June 8, 2016 will not be counted.

If you do not receive a ballot in the mail by May 31, 2016, please <u>call the election judge immediately</u> at (507) 273-0658 and request a replacement ballot.

In the event a run-off election is required, same shall be held on June 30, 2016. The same rules shall apply to the run-off election as were applicable to the regular election.

All officers shall be installed and begin their 3 year terms at the regular meeting of the local union on July 14, 2016.


Candidates shall be entitled to an observer, during the counting of the ballots and when the ballots are picked up from the P.O. Box (The candidate(s) themselves may be the observer.)

Any member who believes a protest of the election is warranted is urged to contact the election judge within a few days after the ballots are counted.

Further protests of the election may be filed in writing with the International Vice President of the district within 30 days following the election.

The decision of the International Vice President shall conclude the processing of a protest within the IBEW.

In the event the protesting member is not satisfied with the decision of the International Vice President, the member may submit his/her protest to the U.S. Department of Labor, Office of Labor Management Standards.
